




Pinehaven Timeline





Community Garden

There has been talk of a community garden on the PPA hall land for some time, but things are finally starting to happen, in a very small way, with the earth turned in preparation for the winter planting of a garlic crop. The garlic we are planting is top quality stock from the organic garden of Jim O'Gorman, who has kindly donated the cloves to get us started. We intend to plant 100 cloves this year which will give us a stock of seed for next year to replant and also sell to raise money for investing back in the garden.

There is, however, more to getting a community garden going than just doing the digging and planting. We need to set up the ground rules (pardon the pun) early to ensure we go into this with our eyes open. There are plenty of examples of community gardens around the world and also locally. Information is readily available on the internet (try www.communitygarden.org.au) and it is important that we learn from the experience of others. The benefits of a community garden are wide reaching - it is not just a place to grow vegetables but also a place for individual learning, community education, social gathering and building a sense of community - a connection to both people and the land.

So, if this sounds like something you want to be involved in, an opportunity to be more actively involved in your community, get to know more people, and learn about organic gardening then come along to the meeting. 





Elmslie Road Logging



A large block of land on Elmslie Road is currently being logged and no doubt you have all seen the notices warning that logging trucks will be travelling through Pinehaven. The PPA was concerned that these notices do not contain any contact details for the company. We have been in touch with the council and are advised that the resource consent, given in 2004, had certain conditions attached to ensure the safety of Pinehaven residents, particularly school children. If there are any problems with the logging trucks, or you become aware that the consent conditions are not being followed, please contact the council directly. As well as those highlighted below, other conditions relate to aspects such as ensuring sediment control, future landscaping, and stormwater discharge.

- No tree removal or earthworks on Sundays
- On school days, logging trucks are prohibited on Blue Mountains Road from 7.15-8.30am and 3.30-4.30pm, and on Elmslie, Forest, and Pinehaven Roads from 8.30-9.15am and 2.45-3.30pm.
